
HELL HATH NO FURY LIKE MOTHER EARTH SCORNED


RISKY CITIES & DEADLY INTERSECTIONS

65% of Australia's population live in capital cities where a threefold increase in heatwave days is projected

(ABS 2010, Herold et al. 2017)

Densely build suburbs with little green space, economic inequality, poor housing, weak social connections & higher proportions of older people living alone




JUST US VS SOCIALLY JUST

Overrepresentation of women in global heatwave morbidity and mortality statistics
